June is Internet Safety Month, first designated by the U.S. Senate in 2010. Since the pandemic began in 2020, there has been a significant rise in children and youth going online - and a corresponding rise in online exploitation. The National Center for Missing and Exploited Children saw a 97% increase in online enticement. Take time to learn more about how children are vulnerable to predators and traffickers online and how you can engage to **be part of the solution** - in your local community, and in the lives of children and youth you know.




Review this blog from Thorn to understand what <u>online grooming</u> is, how it happens, and how to defend children.

Take time to understand the reality and problem of self-produced sexually explicit images by children and how you can keep youth safe in this <u>article from Thorn</u>.


